# CAIRN DEDICATION

May 9, 2018

The new **CANADA 150 CAIRN**, at the Chase Museum, was formally dedicated on Saturday morning, May 05, 2018.

The dedication was attended by our local MP (Mel Arnold), our local MLA (Todd Stone), the Village of Chase (Mayor Rick Berrigan and others), representatives from the various indigenous participants, the Chase Museum and Archives Society, and members of the general public.

The dedication ceremony was opened by the President of the Chase Museum Board, (Anne Lamoureux), and continued with comments by government representatives, and comments, prayers, and blessings by indigenous representatives.

Major funding for the cairn was provided by a grant from the BC Museums Association as part of the Canada 150 Lasting Legacies Program. Support was also provided by the Village of Chase, the Little Shuswap (Skw'lax) Indian Band, the Neskonlith (Sk'atsin te Secwepémc) Indian Band, and the Adams Lake (Cstélec te Secwepémc) Indian Band. The support of all parties is recognized by individual plaques mounted on the cairn. The brass bell mounted on the top of the cairn was originally donated by the CPR, to the Church that was the original occupant of the building that now houses the Chase Museum. The cairn contains a time capsule, to be opened at a distant future date.

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# **Councilor Shelley Witzky Report**

May 24, 2018

Weytkp, Shelley Witzky re skwes. Secwepemc ka. Tkwamipla7 te Cstèlnec. Hello, my name is Shelley Witzky. I am Secwepemc and a Councilor of Adams Lake Band. I am giving a brief update on meetings I attended in May. As a Council, we are in the midst of reviewing the budget and Chief and Council Terms of Reference.

At the end of April, I attended the Wild Salmon Caravan planning meeting in Sorrento. The Wild Salmon Caravan (WSC) main theme is transformative transcending paradox and the darkness surrounding political issues impacting Wild Salmon and their habitat. As such, the WSC coordinates an annual caravan from Vancouver to Mt. Robson with stops in various communities to raise awareness about the importance of wild salmon and educate the public with interactive workshops, dinners, and ceremony. The date for this year's caravan is September 22/18 (Vancouver), 2<sup>nd</sup> stop TBD, last stop September 29/18 Chase, with a Parade. We are looking for facilitators to lead workshops before and during the WSC, such as arts build (kids crafts to learn about salmon), Lahal Tournament, etc. Please email Coordinator Dawn Morrison at: dmo6842@gmail.com for more info or to sign up to facilitate a workshop.

I attended the BC Hydro Protocol Joint Council meeting in Kamloops on May 4, 2018. This table is a steering committee for the work that needs to be done to implement the Secwepemc Protocol with BC Hydro, which is an agreement to work together. The Joint Council reviewed the numerous Terms of Reference and made recommendations for changes that reflect Secwepemc values, title and rights.

On May 5, 2018 I attended the unveiling of the rock cairn and Secwepeme Flag at the Chase Museum, along with a time capsule to be opened in 100 years. Adams Lake and Neskonlith leadership said a few words on the importance of working together and



building relationships. Local MP Mel Arnold, MLA Todd Stone, and Mayor Ron Berrigan also spoke a few words to that affect. An Elder blessed the flag and a pray was said in Secwepemcstin. The three local Bands are represented on 3 sides of the rock cairn, and the Village of Chase on the 4<sup>th</sup> side. It's nice to see our Secwepemc flag represented here. Check it out sometime and see the pictographs etched into the plaques. Kukstemc to the people who coordinated the creation of this rock cairn for their hard work and dedication.

May 14/18 several Council attended the BC Hydro Joint Executive Team meeting in Kamloops to approve the Terms of Reference developed by the steering committee and determine next steps. This executive team meets only twice per year and so it's important to stay on top of this initiative. Again, the Secwepemc Protocol is an agreement to work with BC Hydro to eventually develop capacity to take on aspects of their projects in our traditional territory.

On May 15/18 the Indigenous Tourism Advisory Committee met (with reps from Splatsin, Neskonlith, and Adams Lake Bands) to finalize the job description and contract for a Tourism Coordinator to enhance Secwepeme presence in the Shuswap region tourism.

May 24 and 25, 2018 the 5 Bands met to discuss the Corridor Wide Agreement (CWA) with the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure and how we can develop capacity and partake in the highway expansion and other projects. The 5 Bands are Splatsin, Shuswap Band, Little Shuswap Lake, Neskonlith, and Adams Lake Bands.

Several other internal meetings to move forward ALIB's Strategic Plan are also happening.

# Water Quality Report

Submitted by Trevor Andrew, Public Works Department

May 2, 2018

Great Day Everyone,

Adams Lake Indian Band (ALIB) Public Works Department have received numerous complaints about the water quality for the Sahhaltkum Indian Reserve #4 (IR 4), Chase, BC Water Systems since we put our new well heads into commission in 2014.

The water quality issues that the community members are seeing is discolored water which is being caused from Manganese and Iron. Manganese is one of the most abundant metals in Earth's crust, usually occurring with iron. It is a component of over 100 minerals but is not found naturally in its pure (elemental) form (ATSDR, 2000). Manganese is an element essential to the proper functioning of both humans and animals.

I do 24 bacteriological water samples monthly which equals 288 yearly, and all the bacteriological water samples have come back negative for anything that can bring harm to the human being. To back up the bacteriological samples we do Chemistry Testing which is a very detailed testing procedure and gives the finer details of what elements are in the water. I have attached the Chemistry results to this newsletter.

Action Plan to Resolve Water Quality Issues

- We met with Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC) April 25, 2018 and presented to them the water quality issues for IR 4 Water Systems.
- INAC has approved funding for a proper investigation of the water quality issues
- Western Water and the Public Works Department have joined forces to properly investigate the water quality issues. Collecting daily data on the water parameters.
- Western Water is also doing a Hazard Screening, Risk Mitigation, and Long-Term Monitoring
- Increasing the Chemistry Testing which First Nations Health Authority has approved

When the investigation from Western Water is completed we will be presenting our findings to INAC to for a budget to design and implement a proper water treatment facility to the IR 4 Community Water Systems. If you have any question about the process that we are taking, please call Trevor at 1.250.679.2228.

Also, we will be sharing the data and updates with the community as the investigation continues, we will be more diligent and transparent then we have practiced in the past.

We are truly thankful for your patience and we know our communications has been lacking, we are trying to fix our communication with you the community member. We are looking at a better way to update the community members through the newsletter and using the ALIB web site to communicate about the water because you have the right to be informed.

Please continue to send in complaints about the water quality, we need your help and input, so we can have a stronger foundation for INAC to speed up the process. # NOTICE TO MEMBERSHIP

Are you changing your Band membership in the near future?

Do you have a lawful possession of reserve land (i.e. Certificate of Possession or other evidence of title) with your current First Nation?

IF SO: Read this important information about the operation of Section 25 of the Indian Act.

25(1) "An Indian who ceases to be entitled to reside on a reserve may, within six months or such further period as the Minister may direct, transfer to the band or another member of the band the right to possession of any lands in the reserve of which he was lawfully in possession."

25(2) "Where an Indian does not dispose of his right of possession in accordance with Subsection (1), the right to possession of the land reverts to the band, subject to the to the payment to the Indian who was lawfully in possession of the land, from the funds of the band, of such compensation for permanent improvements as the Minister may determine.

If you are changing Band membership and are affected by Section 25 of the Indian Act, you need to complete a Transfer form (Transfer of Land in an Indian Reserve), and submit the transfer to Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) within 6 months of changing your membership. You will also need to provide the documentation required under the Family Homes on Reserves and Matrimonial Interests or Rights Act.

Any extension to the 6-month period, as noted in Section 25(2), needs to be requested in writing prior to the end of the 6-month period. A lawful possession which is not transferred within the 6-month period will revert to the Band.

# Coming Home to the Heart Releasing Intergenerational Trauma

Diana Allen Shaman, Sacred Sound Musician, Artist, Author

To move ahead and create a future full of infinite possibilities, it is important to clear and heal the thoughts, feelings and actions that have been handed down by our ancestors.

If you have experienced abuse, alcoholism, addictions, depression, loss of cultural pride, loss of safety and respect, feeling worthless or hopeless, these limiting patterns can be released and healed.

If the past is glossed over with false positivity and not released from the DNA cellular memory the energies are active in the subconscious mind and the limiting patterns and beliefs are reenacted and handed down to the next generation. The method Diana teaches is one of releasing, clearing and healing, not re-traumatizing yourself from what you have experienced. The ancestors have also given you unique gifts. Connecting to the heart of compassion is a step to reclaiming your freedom and inner wholeness, finding and sharing your gifts with your community.

Originally from Canada, Diana now lives in France and for the past 30 years has facilitated workshops around the world. She is happy to come back to the Shuswap to assist previous participants to continue their learning and welcome new participants to the powerful clearings and healing that she offers. A few years ago, Diana re-connected with her birth family and found her full blood Cherokee Great Grandmother. The intergenerational trauma is very evident in her birth family and even though she was adopted, the trauma held in the lineage was played out through a physically abusive adoptive mother. Healing the wounds of the ancestors held in the cellular memory so the past can be in its rightful place and not impact your present and future is powerful and important work.







I am writing to see if you might be interested in having a workshop in your community to talk about climate change from your own cultural knowledge and experience.

I am a Coordinator with Indigenous Climate Action (ICA), and we are working to develop a toolkit with Indigenous communities that supports community understanding of climate change (from both scientific and Indigenous forms of knowledge). We would like to seek input into what kind of teaching and planning tools would best support the generation of climate knowledge and leadership in your region.

A little about ICA: we are a very new Indigenous-led organization, working to strengthen Indigenous communities as leaders of climate solutions. We have two very clear targets. At a community and regional level, our aim is to create teaching and planning tools with and for Indigenous communities to spread awareness about climate change. At a national and international level, our goal is to put forward an Indigenous position on climate change from our own cultural values and expertise, so that it will shape policy to protect the earth.

#### Our Vision for the Toolkit

Our aim is to develop a Toolkit that Indigenous peoples can use to build on their own knowledge and strengths; and that provides useful information to help protect our territories and ways of life from the changes taking place.

We are holding workshops in central communities or regions across Canada from February to July 2018, as the first stage in this project. The purpose of each workshop is to:

- Share basic climate change information (both scientific and Indigenous understandings)
- Ask community members what would help raise awareness about climate change in their community/region and what would help to respond to the challenges
- Seek input from communities on the toolkit design (what type of format, what type of content, etc.)

I hope you can join us for the meeting in Kamloops on Tuesday June 5, 2018 from 8:30 am to 5:00 pm. The meeting will be held at Shuswap Nation Tribal Council Conference Room, 680 Athabasca St. West. Lunch, refreshments, and some gas subsidies (if needed) will be provided.



37. Story of Hu'pken.1

Shuswap Stories by James Teit. Each month the *Cstèlnec Newsletter* will reprint a story to share.

James Alexander Teit (1864 - 1922) Born in Scotland, Teit immigrated to Spences Bridge, BC in 1884. In 1904 he visited Secwepeme communities at Splatsin, Shuswap Lake, Kamloops and Savona (Skeetchestn). There are a series of books, many articles and his fieldnotes on his recordings. Teit viewed Native peoples as his contemporaries friends, relatives and neighbours who lived a lifestyle similar to his own.

Hu'pken <sup>2</sup> was a lad who lived with his parents, but would do nothing they told him. He was very mischievous, lazy, and quarrelsome, and would not train himself like other lads. As he was a nuisance to the people, his parents arranged to desert him at the first opportunity.

One day the boy went off into the woods and lay down in the shade, as he felt very lazy, and thought his parents might send him to do some work. When he returned home at sundown, he found the houses all deserted, so he started to follow the people's tracks and learn where they had gone. He said, "They cannot be far away, for I hear them whistling." He went in the direction of the sound, but next time it came from another quarter, — sometimes in front of him, then behind him, sometimes distant, and again close. Soon he became weary of following the sound, which really came from the excrements of the people, and, as it was getting dark, he returned to the village.

He entered one house after another, feeling very angry and disconsolate: He could find nothing to eat, except in the houses of Raven and Crow, who had left some fish-skins and other scraps. In the last house he noticed a large basket turned mouth down, and, feeling angry, he kicked it over, saying, "Why did the people not take this with them also?"

He was surprised to find his old grandmother hidden underneath. She was too old to follow the people, and they had left her behind. He was going to kick her also, but she said to him, "Do not kick me! I will be of service to you, and will teach you many things. Here is a lighted slowmatch. Kindle a fire with it."

Then the old woman taught him how to make bows and arrows, and shoot game, that they might have food and clothing. At first he shot mice, rats, chipmunks, and squirrels; and the old woman sewed their skins together and made robes. Then he shot many bright-plumaged birds, and she also sewed their skins into robes. On sunny days the lad delighted in spreading out all his many robes in the sunshine, and admiring them. At last he was able to shoot large game, such as deer, sheep, elk, and bears, and he soon had great stores of skins, fat, and meat.

Now Porcupine happened to come along. When he saw the large

amount of provisions the lad had collected, he hurried away to the people's camp, and told them that Hu'pken was now a great hunter, and had large stores of meat and fat, and many beautiful robes. The people would not believe Porcupine's story, and sent Crow to verify the report.

When Crow arrived, Hu'pken invited him to eat, and asked him how the people fared. Crow said, "We have found very little game, and are all starving." When he returned, Hu'pken gave him a present of fat to carry to the people; but Crow hid it and told the people that Porcupine had lied about the lad, who was just as poor as when they left him. During the night Crow got up and fed his children with some of the fat. The children quarrelled over the food, and made much noise as they ate; and the people, hearing them, said, "Crow is feeding his children secretly."

Crow returned to Hu'pken and got more fat, which he fed to his children, so that they became fat and sleek. Then the people said, "Crow must feed his children on good food, for they are getting fat, while our children are getting thin. We know he is no hunter, and cannot kill game. Where does he obtain his supply?" They sent Flying-Squirrel to watch Crow. He clad himself in black moss, and, keeping in the timber, walked along unobserved, and watched Crow's camp. Seeing Crow's children eating fat<sup>1</sup>, he returned and informed the people, who asked Crow where he got it, and the acknowledged that he received it from Hu'pken. The people then returned to their village, where they were feasted by the lad. Hu'pken had filled the houses of Crow and others who had left him food, but he put no meat into the houses of those who had not pitied him.



# Are you a Sixties Scoop Survivor? A proposed settlement may affect you.

The Ontario Superior Court and the Federal Court will decide on a proposed settlement in Saskatoon May 10, 11, 2018 at 10am and in Toronto on May 29, 30, 2018 at 10am.

The Proposed Settlement Benefits: It will provide compensation to all Class Members who were adopted or made permanent wards and who were alive on February 20, 2009. The proposed settlement will also establish a foundation to enable change and reconciliation and access to education, healing/wellness and commemoration activities for communities and individuals. The Foundation is intended to bridge the generations and give meaning to suffering as well as to provide healing and reconciliation for the whole of Canada, now and for the future. Benefits from the Foundation are not restricted to Class Members.

Canada has agreed to fund the Foundation in the amount of at least \$50 million to enable change and reconciliation and, in particular, access to education, healing/wellness and commemoration activities for communities and individuals.

Canada has also agreed to make payments to Eligible Class Members as follows: If fewer than 20,000 Eligible Class Members submit claims, each Eligible Class Member will receive an amount equal to \$500 million divided by the number of Eligible Class Members who submit claims, to a maximum for \$50,000 per person.

If between 20,000 and 30,000 Eligible Class Members submit claims, each Eligible Class Member will receive \$25,000.

If more than 30,000 Eligible Class Members submit claims, each Eligible Class Member will receive an amount equal to \$750 million divided by the number of Eligible Class Members who submit claims.

If there are fewer than 20,000 claims by Eligible Class Members and the total amount paid to Eligible Class Members is less than \$500 million, the difference between the total amount paid to Eligible Class Members and \$500 million shall be paid to the Foundation.

The proposed settlement includes all registered Indians and Inuit people who removed from their homes in Canada between January 1, 1951 and December 31, 1991 and placed in the care of non-Indigenous foster or adoptive parents.
