The journey then entered the Harrison Lake at the North End and camped at Long Island, Harrison Hot Springs, and the final destination and feast at Sq'ewlets First Nation. The Adams Lake team consisted of Nelson Leon (skipper), Tim Johnson (skipper), Adams Lake youth, and our ground crew and organizers.



The Adams Lake canoe team have not only become excellake trips, etc.) and I encourage you to talk to your familient paddlers, but great youth ambassadors for our comlies and arrange a canoe trip this summer. 
Youth from ALIB enjoying a pose before they go out and start another day of paddling in the 10 day Pulling Together Canoe Journey.



Band Members - Administration Building Survey WE WANT TO HEAR FROM YOU

Adams Lake Indian Band (ALIB) is looking to replace and consolidate its outdated band offices on Indian Reserve #4 in Chase, BC. We are seeking input from all Band Members on the building and lot selection. The capital construction costs for the building and site range from \$5 million to potentially \$10 million. A video presentation has been created and can be found on our web site www.adamslakeband.org showing the 4 building options and 3 potential site locations. When the main band office buildings are replaced by the new administration building, ALIB will clear and level the affected lands and replace with a proposed park setting or give us another suggestion for the land use.

The survey should take less than 5 minutes to complete and all information will remain confidential. This survey is for Adams Lake Indian Band Members. 
Brennan Creek Campout

The Adams Lake Indian Band organized a community campout at a former school site at Brennan Creek on the Adams Lake. This event was organized to discuss opportunities for ALIB to take back management and control of land along the Adams Lake. The Brennan Creek school site has been abandoned for several years and we are seeking to use this school as a satellite office for Chief Atahm and community education. In addition, we highlighted 16 more village sites along the Adams Lake that our Band is seeking to maintain and control.


The campout was well attended and site tours were arranged at various sites along the lake including pictograph sites, village sites, and other areas that are being developed. The first night was we set-up camp, the sec-



ond day various tours were arranged throughout the day (Johnson Lake, White Bluffs, Hindu Point), and everyone enjoyed swimming, fishing, canoeing and games. Saturday evening elder Mike Arnouse led participants in a ceremony to welcome people back onto their land and gave some history of our people's use and occupation of the

lake. After the ceremony there was an awesome feast cooked by Pete and Lana and discussion on future plans for management of the Adams Lake.

It is very important that ALIB starts to assert control and jurisdiction of its traditional territory and the Adams Lake is a great place to start. Home to our people for thousands of years the Adams Lake is the source of pristine water, habitat for migrating salmon, and the water source for a large wildlife popula-



tion. As with most beautiful lakes in our territory, the Adams Lake is under constant development pressure. A quick tour of the lake identified new camp sites, resort development, RV parks, and extensive boating and fishing.

The ALIB will continue this initiative and will be one of many campouts and tours to reoccupy the traditional territory. Thanks to all those that participated and organized; the spirit, energy, and fun at this event was amazing. I look forward to the next event and if you have any questions please do not hesitate to contact me. We will have this as a top priority agenda item at our monthly title and rights meeting last Thursday of the month at ALRCC gym.

Natural Resources Pillar Update

for March to June 2016

I previously submitted an opinion article as my last Council report in May, which didn't include any updates on the Natural Resources Pillar. The following report provides that information.

Forestry:

We have logging permits for areas including Adams Lake, Mt. Ida, Ptarmigan Hills/Fisher Creek, Cahility, and Louis Creek.

Silviculture:

Planting operations of ½ a million trees is complete. On-going brushing and Silviculture surveys.

Community Wildfire Protection:

Fuel management projects on I.R. # 2 / 4 / 5 are complete.

Fisheries:

Phase 1 Sinmax Creek habitat enhancement project is complete.

Phase 2 Sinmax Creek habitat enhancement will take place this year. Denny Coates contractor.

On-going communal fisheries, Coho stream walks, and Chinook creel surveys upcoming this season.

Archeology: (Highway 1 Four Lane Expansion)

On-going monitoring of Hoffman's Bluff to Neskonlith Reserve.

Monte Creek to Pritchard is complete. (Site # 45 included)

Salmon Arm West and Chase Creek West are pending.

<u>Archeology & Cultural Heritage Assessments for Forestry:</u>

PFR surveys of about 400 proposed cut blocks was completed last year and a similar amount is scheduled for this year.

Recreation Site Maintenance:

On-going co-management of 12 campgrounds within the Adams Lake Watershed.

GIS:

On-going mapping for our forestry initiatives.

Developing a mapping system for internal use by

Lands, PW & Housing, and T & R Departments.

Training:

Silviculture surveying, RISC, firefighting, and environmental monitoring all complete.

Meetings and Conferences attended:

March 3 Emergency Operations Center training that is mandatory for my position as the ALB liaison officer for community emergencies.

March 10 Interfor meeting to discuss terms of a proposed impact benefits & revenue sharing agreement. My role is to provide advice and political support to ALB technical staff.

March 11 and April 25 The Wild Salmon Caravan planning committee. My role is to facilitate the Chase portion of the caravan coming thru here in early June.

March 11 Chief Billy asked me to take his place at the MOTI Senior Council discussions in Kamloops.

March 14 and April 13 SFC / DFO Conservation & Management Technical Working Group meetings in Kamloops. My role is to continually lobby DFO for First Nations shared decision making authority over policies and programs relating to fisheries management, stock enhancement, and habitat protection.

March 17 / May 19 & 30 Reconciliation Framework Agreement (RFA) in Kamloops. The original intent of the RFA was to build a joint decision making consultation process between First Nations and the Province, but this has yet to be fulfilled.

March 31 I chaired the membership committee meeting. Finally, after many years the updated membership rules have gone to C & C for review. The next step will be to communicate them out to the membership before having two community readings, followed by the vote.

April 5-7 Forum on Conservation & Harvest Planning for Fraser Salmon in Kamloops. I was honored to do the opening and meal prayers. The forum is intended to provide an annual process for information sharing and discussion on Fraser salmon fisheries issues between DFO and First Nations. The First Nations use this opportunity to provide advice and recommendations on fisheries management plans.

April 14 Went on a site tour of Malakwa Bridge fishing camp. All Sexqeltkeme to Seewepeme (Lakes Division or StS) First Nations are able to use the fishing camp.

April 15 and June 20 Shuswap Trails Alliance (STA). My role is to ensure First Nations traditional land use and resource protection values are respected, and followed, when trails are being proposed in our territory.

April 20–22 Sexqeltkemc te Secwepemc Joint Council meetings in Invermere. Participated in a pipe ceremony to set a healthy spiritual context for the meetings. The Little Shuswap and Shuswap bands were asked to become signatories, to the StS, during the meeting discussions.

April 28 Water Sustainability Act (WSA) forum in Kamloops. The purpose of the forum is to share information about the intent and implementation of the WSA.

May 13 Adams River Gorge Pictograph Protection Working Group. My role is to provide input and political support on the plan to build protective plexiglass covers on top of the vandalized pictographs.

May 10 participated in the Village of Chase Council meeting. I spoke to the importance of both communities working together to create safe and healthy lifestyles on both sides of the river.

May 25 Salmon Arm West Bay Trail Working Group.

My role is to provide advice and political support for the proposed boardwalk along the shoreline of Salmon Arm Bay, connecting the Indian Reserve and Salmon Arm city.

May 26–27 Columbia Basin Regional Advisory Committee. My role is provide input to help inform hydro-electric facilities of potential improvements to the Canada / US Columbia River Treaty. This was a video conference in my office streaming live from the meeting in Castlegar.

May 5–10 I travelled with Elder Mike Arnouse to the Wild Salmon Caravan from Mt. Robson to Matsqui First Nation. Hosted the caravan on May 7th in our community. The intention of the caravan is to nurture creative energy inspired by wild salmon and affirm inter-tribal relationships that are the foundation of Indigenous trade and fisheries knowledge adapted over the generations.

June 13 participated in the Financial Administration Law (FAL) workshop in Kamloops. FAL discussions will take place with community members as we learn more about its potential impacts and benefits.

June 15 Went on a site tour of the Brennan Creek school buildings and property. The intent is to negotiate a \$1.00 per year lease for the site, while we plan to take over the area for our wilderness cultural education center and family campground.

June 17 I travelled with elder Mike Arnouse to the Highway #1 monument ceremony honoring our ancient connection to the trail corridor, upon which the highway was built.

June 20 Shuswap Trails Alliance Regional Strategy Working Group in Salmon Arm. Discussion regarding replacing Provincial Park names with our Secwepeme place names.

Counsellors Report July 2016

Community Services Pillar

This report will focus upon three areas that will assist on moving on a path forward. Firstly, I lift my hands to those community members who strive to live healthy lives and continue to role model this way of life to our children, "Kukstsemc".

I attended a two-day workshop in Vancouver, B.C. First Nation Children and Family Gathering. The purpose of this workshop was to call to action; Reconciliation and Self-determination for First Nations children, Families and Nations in B.C. The immediate call to action stems from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Recommendations, one to five, out of the ninety-four recommendations that refer to child welfare. The Truth and Reconciliation Commission is the study that was carried out across Canada identifying the impact of Residential Schools on the generation of this First People that continue to be the cause of community unhealthiness.

Both the Federal and Provincial government are responding to the recommendations in small step to address the recommendations as leaders, its our responsibility to continue to put forward initiatives that will address children and family needs.

Cindy Blackstock, Executive Director of First Nations Child and Family Caring Society of Canada, filed a law suit against the Federal Government for discrimination against the amount

of welfare children families receive on reserve compared to those living off reserve. The courts ruled in favor of the judgment against the Federal Government. The Second, area is my participation with Secwepemc Children & Families Services (SCFS). This delegated agency that provides services to our band. Initially SCFS was established as a stepping stone for Secwepemc Bands to develop policies and laws to provide services to community. Moving Forward, included participation at Board Meeting, selection of an Executive Director (Linda Thomas), who is aware of the issues that face communities as a Social Worker and as a Lawyer that has a keen interest in Children that are in courts.

What can we do, to-day? Focus immediately on good practice, increase focus on families, and address what effects family. I am working with Health Director, Housing Director and our Executive Director to establish a safe house. The focus of this endeavor is to provide a safe place for children. How do we stand up for our children? Put responsibility back where it belongs with each of us living in our community.

The third area is my participation with Round Lake Treatment Centre, as president of the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors works with the Executive Director and funding sources are building a recovery home adjacent to

the Treatment Center that will house those persons who do not meet the requirement of sobriety. This facility will ensure more people will receive the treatment they require in a safe environment.

I continue to attend meetings that are important to moving forward in areas that will ensure a healthy path for all to walk on. I encourage you to attend,



COMING SOON TO ALIB TAKE HOME NALOXONE KITS

How is naloxone given? You can give naloxone by injection (into a muscle, or under the skin). In BC, the Take Home Naloxone program supplies injectable naloxone. You can inject naloxone through clothing into the muscle of the upper arm, upper leg, or buttock.

I don't use Opioids. Why should I be aware about Naloxone? Due to the amount of overdose deaths linked to Fentanyl, a deadly drug being laced in drugs. You never know when you may encounter an unresponsive person and could prevent their death by administering Naloxone if they were to have a kit on them.

What is naloxone?

Naloxone, or Narcan⁶, counteracts opioid overdose. Taking too much of opioid drugs (like morphine, heroin, methadone, oxycodone, and fentanyl) can make breathing slow down or stop. Naloxone reverses this, restoring normal breathing.
